The museum is open to the public from 9 AM to 5 PM, seven days a week. Visit our website to learn more about group tours and educational programs.












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
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A LONG-AWAITED THE 1924 INDIANAPOLIS 500




Above: 1924 Indianapolis 500 starting lineup

As the date quickly approached for the 12th running of the Indianapolis 500-mile race in 1924, Fred and Augie Duesenberg likely could not have helped themselves from reminiscing about their results from the previous few years. Coming off of a great high in 1921 from winning the French Grand Prix (the first American car to achieve that feat) to finishing second in the 1921 and 1922 Indianapolis 500 races, the team was met with a lull. AAA engine displacement regulation changes were put in place, reducing from the three-liter formula down to two liters, in order to better fit in with European racing standards. Because of this, Duesenberg had to re-design its racing engines and was only able to field one race car in the 1923 running. They came in a disappointing 10th place out of the 11 cars that finished. The race cars and engine designs of competitor Harry Miller dominated all competition. May 30 was approaching, and they needed a good result.

With another year to work on and perfect the two-liter racing engine, Fred Duesenberg developed his first dual overhead cam engine with four valves per cylinder – a design he would later further develop for use in the Duesenberg Model J. It kept with the eight-cylinder layout, and he was even able to secretly incorporate a supercharger on it. As long as the race car remained under the 1,450-pound weight limit, he worked to eke out all of the power he could get. Once the track opened on May 1 for practice, he was able to test the engine in earnest.

Qualifying for the race was soon approaching. The single Duesenberg entry in 1923 qualified with an average speed of 88 mph, the second lowest of the 24 competitors. They had to do better. Four Duesenberg race cars were entered into qualifying, three of which were supercharged. Luckily this year, the Duesenberg team had a mix of seasoned competitors and youthful vigor. Indiana-native Lora Corum drove in the #15. He was familiar with the Indianapolis 500 race and

was cautious, but steady. Joe Boyer drove the #9 race car, had a few years of racing under his belt and tended to race more aggressively. Ernie Ansterburg in the #10 was an up-and-coming racer gaining important experience. Rounding out the team was veteran racer Peter DePaolo driving the non-supercharged #12. DePaolo had considerable racing insight and knowledge from his uncle Ralph DePalma. Solely on relief-driver duty was Thane Houser. Wade Morton, who raced the lone Duesenberg race car in 1923, instead participated as a relief driver for two Miller-powered race cars sponsored by Durant.

The qualifying laps went much better for Duesenberg. Boyer topped the Duesenberg qualifying effort at 104.84 mph, 16 mph faster than 1923 and good for a fourth place start. Ansterburg and DePaolo were neck

and neck with average speeds of 99.4 mph and 99.28 mph, placing 10th and 13th, respectively, in a very tight middle pack. Corum achieved 93.33 mph and started 21st of the 22 qualifiers.

Everything was ready and seemed in order as the pace laps began. Henry Ford was the honorary referee, and the Pace Car was a Cole V8 driven by Lew Pettijohn. The track conditions were considered perfect, with partly sunny weather headed to a high of 67 degrees, despite the near inch of rain and humidity the day before. As Pettijohn in the Cole pulled into the pits signaling the end of the pace laps, the crowd of 135,000 grew into a roar, as the revving engines became louder and the speeds dramatically increased.

The race couldn't have started both better and worse for the Duesenberg race cars. The aggressive Boyer had a great initial start thanks in large part to the supercharger, allowing him to gain more power and speed quicker than Jimmy Murphy, Harry Hartz and Tommy Milton ahead of him. Boyer sped into first place. But as quickly as the supercharger helped him gain the lead, it experienced a problem causing him to quickly lose pace after being in front just a single lap. Several unscheduled pit stops caused him to fall further and further behind. Ansterburg crashed on turn two on the second lap, forcing him and his car out of the race. He thankfully walked away from the crash, but was surely disappointed by the quick exit.

The next hundred laps of the 200-lap race were fairly uneventful, with Murphy and Earl Cooper taking turns leading the event in their Miller-powered race car. The more powerful cars and the more skillful drivers continued to pull further away from the rest, leading other racers by gaps of several miles.

As the race wore on, so did the cars – particularly the fuel systems. Milton's car developed a fuel tank leak on lap 110, which ended his day in 21st place. Durant had fuel line issues with two different race cars. Frank Elliott and Eddie Hearne had fuel tank issues after 150 laps. While these issues were occurring, the event was heating up.

Boyer's hobbled #9 race car, having competed for 93 laps, came into the pit and Boyer was relieved by Ansterburg, who drove it for 65 laps. Ansterburg ended the day with an official last place finish in 22nd and a meager \$5 payout. Corum was the leading Duesenberg at the time Boyer entered the pit, running in 5th place. The four drivers in front were all in Miller race cars. Fred Duesenberg, determined to beat the Miller cars, brought in Corum and had Boyer relieve him on lap 112. Fred told Boyer, "put it in front or burn it up!" Corum went on to relieve Ansterburg in the #9 car on lap 159, and drove for only 17 laps until he was replaced by Houser on lap 176. Houser, already at the race solely for relief duty, successfully drove the #9 for one lap, and crashed on the southwest wall. Two of the four Duesenberg cars were out, leaving just Boyer in the #15 and DePaolo in the #12.

Boyer took Fred Duesenberg's charged words to heart, and used his aggressive racing style to his advantage. After taking over for Corum, he had a lot of ground to make up. Over the course of 65 laps, he steadily gained on the competition. Soon, drivers Bennett Hill and Hartz were in his rearview mirror. At lap 160, Boyer was about a mile behind leader Cooper and Murphy, and was finishing laps equal to or greater than his 104 mph qualifying effort. Murphy knew he needed to increase his pace to try to fend off the incoming Boyer. Unfortunately, he cut a tire and had to pit, giving Boyer 2nd place. On lap 177, Boyer charged ahead of Cooper, taking back first place after 175 laps. Cooper held close to Boyer for the next 13 laps, but during an attempt to overtake him on lap 188, Cooper skidded and cut a tire, forcing him to pit. The next 12 laps were textbook for Boyer, who knew that all he had to do was keep his race car on the track to win.

After 5 hours, 5 minutes and 23 seconds, Boyer took the checkered flag and crossed the finish line, giving both him and the Duesenberg the long sought-after first Indianapolis 500 victory. Cooper crossed the finish line 1 minute and 23 seconds later for 2nd place, with Murphy 2 minutes and 40 seconds after that. DePaolo successfully completed the event in 6th place, giving Duesenberg two race cars that

successfully completed the sweepstakes. Boyer's average speed of 98.23 mph for the race was a track record that stood until the following year.

Tired but relieved, Boyer and Corum took to the stands, having been named co-winners of the 1924 event – a first in track history. Leading the race with both the winning #15 car and the #9 he started with, Boyer was officially recorded as placing in both first and 18th. They took turns posing in the winning car, while official photography company Kirkpatrick Studio captured their likenesses for history.

Fred and Augie Duesenberg reveled in their delight. To finally win their hometown race was a dream come true. From German immigrants dreaming of speed and glory, to owners and engineers of a storied and winning racing team, Fred and Augie had achieved what so many others have tried to gain.

Duesenberg would go on to win the Indianapolis 500 two more times in 1925 and 1927. It supplied race car chassis and engines to other teams. Its engines set land speed records, and continued to push the limits of power and prestige. Its knowledge and engineering prowess incorporated new technology and ideas into both race cars and passenger cars, and continued to set the standard of which others hoped to achieve.

"We have the ability to provide personal attention and all of the amenities of a larger airport here at the DeKalb County Airport," says Joel Pierce, general manager of Sweet Aviation. "And you can't beat the convenience factor. It's easy in and out."

Sweet Aviation is a full-service Fixed Base Operator (FBO) that has been operating at the DeKalb County Airport for nearly two years offering concierge services, AvGas and Jet-A, maintenance, flight instruction and more.

Sweet Aviation's main headquarters is located at Smith Field Airport in Fort Wayne and has operations at Fort Wayne International Airport as well.

It is no surprise then that he bought his first Auburn in 1965 at only 16 years old. He also borrowed a Cord from Gordan Buehrig for his graduation night. ACD Cars have been his passion almost his entire life and it didn't take long before his mechanical aptitude and keen eye for detail also became evident to those around him.

in Orange County, California and to no surprise completed his first restoration on an Auburn Phaeton Sedan, Throughout his career, Randy Ema has become synonymous with the restoration of some of the most iconic cars in automotive history. From meticulously restoring rare Ferraris to bringing vintage Bugattis back to their former glory, his expertise knows no bounds. His many accolades at Pebble Beach and beyond are a testament to his work. Each project undertaken by Ema is not merely a restoration but a labor of love, driven by his passion for preserving the legacy of these automotive masterpieces.

Beyond his exceptional restoration work, Randy Ema has also played a pivotal role in uncovering many lost automotive treasures. His keen intuition and extensive network within the automotive community have led him to discover forgotten relics tucked away in barns and garages across the country. 3 QUESTIONS WITH RANDY EMA

Approximately how many cars have you restored, and which was your most memorable to date?

From the day the shop opened in 1976 until we closed in 2021, I have been a part of 39 total restorations and 61 partial or full Duesenberg restorations. The two most memorable to date were a 1941 Mercedes-Benz 770K that came to me in boxes. That was interesting! The second being the 1931 Model J LaGrande coupe, which is known as one of the two 'lost' Duesenberg original Model J coupes. We had to build an entirely new body from scratch using only 3 known factory photos.

What is one piece of advice you would give your 16-year-old self, knowing what you know now?

I have been inspired by cars my whole life, so being around them is just an extension of myself. I have learned so much through the years just by simply showing up and talking to the right people. Don't hesitate to ask questions. Sometimes you just have to get in there and start working on it to figure out the solution. Honor the history first and try to learn as much of the story as you can.

What do you wish your legacy to be? How can the rest of us help keep that alive?

I see myself as a historian first. History is what history is; the good and the bad. All we can do is preserve it, not rewrite it for our own narrative. Having that awareness and discretion is key. Once you honor that in a restoration, get out there and show people! Expose, ride, touch, feel, and let them be a part of the experience. That is the only way I see we are going to pass on this art form. You've got to find ways to get people off of their phone and drag them out for the love of these cars and their communities.

THE NEXT STAY FOR

The once notorious gathering grounds for Auburn, Cord and Duesenberg car enthusiasts now sits as rubble. The Auburn Hotel, a building with a history as rich as the oak paneling that once filled its lobby, was demolished in March 2024 as a result of deteriorating building conditions.

"We don't know where we are going unless we know where we came from," explains DeKalb County Historian Mary Hollabaugh Diehl. "If we don't foster and preserve our history, we lose that lure to our county."

Originally constructed in the 1860s as a wood frame structure, the Auburn Hotel stood as a beacon of hospitality for over a century. According to county records, in the 1870s the hotel became known as the Swineford Hotel and was built over the original wooden structure with the use of bricks. The space was then expanded and transformed in the early 1900s into the design that remained until the building's demolition this year. With its distinctive architecture and elegant façade, the hotel served as a testament to the classic car capital of the world's automotive heritage and enduring legacy.

"I know this building has such a rich car history," says Diehl. "I've read just so many stories about people coming from all over the country staying there. Even though it didn't have air conditioning, and they may have had to share a bathroom – those stories are just iconic. These stories are a part of the tapestry of what Auburn is, and it's incredibly sad to lose such a staple in the community."

Over the 68 years of ACD Festival action, the hotel served as the hub for ACD Club members to connect with the classics. The space surrounding the hotel, better known as the "9th Street Experience" located between Jackson and Main Streets, presented a gathering place for club members.

"It was always an Auburn tradition for the ACD Club members to congregate there," explains ACD Club member Jon Bill. "And that was one of the reasons we bought our house here, because we want to be downtown and close to all the action."

Bill, the former Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum curator and proud enthusiastic owner of a 1936 Auburn alongside his wife Peggy, lives in a historic home directly next to the former hotel grounds.

One of the hotel's most distinctive features that attracted (and at times shocked) car visitors was its raw, unpreserved, untouched presence. Visitors who stepped into the lobby were transported back in time, greeted by the opulence and grandeur of a bygone era.

"I just love anything old, even if it's not in the best condition," explains Peggy.

"The place is just filled with nostalgia," says Jon. "Right down to the fixtures, which were mostly all original. Many of the items in the rooms were antiques and it was just a fantastic experience for the people that stayed there, I'm sure."

Even with its water-damaged ceilings, soggy floors, crumbling and peeling walls, and shared communal bathrooms, the Auburn Hotel held ACD Festival guests up until 2023. Kevin Minard, managing partner, halted hotel use because of worsening building conditions and concerns with the safety of the structural foundation of the historic space.

"The bricks were really getting crumbly in places on the south side of the building toward our house," says Peggy. "It was getting kind of dangerous."

"It's sad to live here next to it all these years and see it deteriorate," says Jon. "It just got worse and worse, to the point where we were wondering if it was going to crumble down onto our house."

Demolition of the downtown Auburn space began earlier this year led by Matt Faber of M.F. Projects.

"It was becoming harmful to the community. A remodel or a restoration just wasn't in the cards as far as longevity and the best quality of place for the community," says Faber.

Faber, the general contractor of the project, is working directly under the guidance and direction of Minard to rebuild and recreate the Auburn Hotel, mimicking the building's original historic look. The rebuilt space will feature apartments and business storefronts.

"It will be a piece of art when it's all done; that's the goal," says Faber. "We've gone through and really tried to reclaim, reuse and recycle as much as possible. We've reclaimed parts from the inside including doors, hardware, woodwork and marble from the front lobby."

The M.F. Project team anticipates the construction to span in total about three years. Faber says it will take around 18 months to get the foundation and steel frame of the building erect, and another 18 months to build out the commercial and residential spaces.

"I live here in Auburn, so this is kind of like being in your own house, your own backyard," says Faber. "I'm fortunate and blessed that I get to work in our community and make such a change that is good for Auburn and DeKalb County."

"All things considered, the plans for the property right now I think are in everyone's best interest," says Jon. "We'll get something similar to what was there, and something that will be useable. I think it will be a nice addition to downtown Auburn. I'm sure with the new building, people will create new memories."

"The spirit will live on, it just will look different," says Diehl. "Just like anything else that leaves us, it continues to live on in the hearts and souls of everybody."



4 QUESTIONS WITH KEVIN MINARD & MATT FABER

Kevin, please tell us about your background and what brought you to Auburn.

I'm originally from Valparaiso and a graduate of the Kelley School of Business at Indiana University. My background is in public accounting, banking, custom homes and commercial real estate construction, which took me to New York. One of my connections in New York was also from Indiana, and we decided to seek opportunities in our home state. We looked at northwest Indiana, Bloomington and Auburn, where we found the Auburn Hotel property.

Tell us a little about this project.

After thorough research into the structural integrity of the hotel, it was determined that it simply could not be safely remodeled. The decision was made to take it down and replace it with a new structure. The first floor will be commercial space with a lobby and maybe a small café, and above that will be apartments/condominiums. Previous building tenants are welcome to return. We have spoken with Four Crowns about their interest in returning, and to another previous tenant who is highly interested.

The City of Auburn has a vision for downtown, and we want to help by being a part of that economic development. We saved as many items from the old hotel as we could and they are currently at Reclaimed in Fort Wayne. All proceeds from the sales will be donated to the Eckhart Library Living History Project at the Willennar Genealogy Center.

What is the target start date for the new building?

[Kevin] There will be progress toward the new building with something coming out of the ground by the 2024 Labor Day weekend. By Labor Day 2025, the exterior should be completed and apartments under construction.

[Matt] Part of the hiring process for the construction manager was that we wanted someone with a local presence. Living in Auburn and graduating from DeKalb High School, I was eager to get onboard with the hotel project and lend it a local perspective.

What was your impression of the ACD Festival?

Last year we rented a room downtown and hung out on 9th Street with ACD Club members. We were able to discuss the project with many people and received a lot of support. One Club member even gave us a ride in a Duesenberg, which was a highlight of our weekend.

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DID POY KNOW?

The story of the Auburn Hotel begins in the 1860s when the first hotel on this site, The Weaver Hotel, was built and run by S.W. Ralston. S.C. Swineford acquired the site in 1870 and proceeded to build the Swineford House, which opened in 1873. The first floor had a lobby, a red-carpeted, gaslit dining room, and four "sample" rooms that were rented to salesmen by the day

> or week to display wares or host reviews. Thirtysix quest rooms were on the second and third floors and rented for \$2.50 a night, or \$65.65 in 2024. The Swineford House operated its own hack service - horse drawn carriage for-hire service – providing transportation for

guests arriving and departing by train at Auburn Junction.

In 1915 Perry Haffley, who owned the Swineford House, sold it to Donald Foust. Foust spent roughly three years remodeling the hotel and changed the name to the Auburn Hotel, which opened in 1919.

An unproven, but popular, story is that John Dillinger stayed at the hotel prior to raiding the Auburn Jail in October of 1933. Dillinger's men did come to Auburn in October 1933, locking two police officers in a cell before absconding with around \$1,000 worth of guns, ammunition and bullet-proof vests. Greta Garbo and Clark Gable were other illustrious hotel guests.

Mr. Foust operated it until 1974 when it was sold to The Kruse Company which closed the hotel and only opened it during the ACD Festival.

Between 1979 and 1981, Roger Eddy of Portland, Oregon took over the hotel, but it continued to be used for tourism only on Labor Day weekend for the festival. The Auburn Hotel was often featured during Labor Day weekend festivities as the parade passed by and Auburn Automobile cars were often shown at car meets near the hotel.

In 2018, The Auburn Hotel was put up for sale by the Eddy family. On Feb. 24, 2023, it was purchased by Kevin Minard of the Auburn Development Group. 🕭

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
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

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BUILDING ON

HISTORY

THE TRADES PROGRAM AT GARRETT HIGH SCHOOL IS CHALLENGING STUDENTS TO TRY SOMETHING NEW, WHILE UPHOLDING THE COUNTY'S RICH AUTOMOBILE HISTORY.

As the executive director of Visit DeKalb, Amber Caccamo's job is to highlight what makes DeKalb County unique and to showcase everything it has to offer.

"When I'm out and about trying to promote Auburn and the rest of the county, cars are such a big part of how the rest of the world sees us," Caccamo says. "I am always thinking about ways to infuse cars because it's such a niche brand, but it is a big part of our history."

Borrowing a car from the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum wasn't always logistically easy, so she came up with an idea that was not only innovative, but would prove to be inspirational for future generations. Caccamo turned to Corey Schoon, the director of the Career Development Program at Garrett High School and asked, 'What if students in the trades program could build their own race car?' It would be a win-win, she thought. They'd learn valuable lessons and the finished product could help her shine a spotlight on DeKalb County's rich automobile history.

"We could put our kids in the weld booth and teach them how to weld. That, to me, is no different than a basketball coach just focusing on dribbling a basketball," explains Schoon. "Eventually, you have to learn to play the game – and playing the game, for us, is actual fabrication. It's not just the skill of welding, but it's actually fabricating something. That's what we're trying to do with this project."

With nothing more than an eagerness to learn, basic welding and fabrication skills, and some guidance from an experienced race care builder, Gary Babineau, the students set out to build an actual car. They're taking project-based learning to a whole new level.



"This is not a purist project. We're not trying to recreate a Duesenberg," stresses Caccamo. "We don't want to build a replica; we're building a tribute to the early racers. We want to give the students a little bit of wiggle room to make some mistakes, to learn, to build, break, rebuild – however that process goes. It doesn't need to be perfect. This is a teachable project for our kids to be invested in our history and to build skills that they can be inspired by and take to whatever job it is they fall into."

As an underclassman, Garrett High School senior DeAnna Spriggs has studied fabricating and welding, but she's never tackled anything quite like this.

"I wasn't a big fan of doing anything with automobiles because at the time, it just wasn't my interest. But when I got to see the frame of the vehicle for the first time and realized that I was actually going to learn how to do this, I definitely got excited because it was a new experience and a new opportunity to learn and grow," Spriggs says.

Last December, using a borrowed chassis from a 1918 Auburn, about 20 students began to piece the car together.

"There are no blueprints, so these kids are having to design what they think looks right and then go back and create the technical drawings," Schoon says. "Not only are they building it but, in a sense, they are reverse engineering it."

"I really think it's amazing to see how the car came in – just a bare frame on one piece of plywood on the floor – and now to see it with all these parts that we've made by hand," says senior Blake Sheets. "It's been neat to watch this transform. You can't just go and buy these parts. You have to make programs with our equipment that we have here and make these pieces and parts from scratch. There's a lot of trial and error."

That's the beauty of a project like this, says Schoon, who's watched as the students have developed problem-solving skills, learned how to collaborate, and expanded their knowledge both outside and inside the classroom.

"We're going across curriculum as much as possible. Our English department has pivoted to allow the kids to do research, and that's becoming their presentation for their senior thesis. They're answering questions like, 'What happened to the Duesenberg? What were the parts used?' For example, the distributor was built in Anderson, Indiana. 'What happened to that company?' It's been a really cool project that is being embraced throughout the school," Schoon says.

"We've researched E.L. Cord, the Duesenberg brothers and the Eckhart brothers, [who ran the Auburn Automobile Company] and we ended up going to the museum and learning the roots of where all of this began," says Sheets. "The biggest thing I've learned is the history. I knew there was a lot behind this, but I didn't know it was so involved. It just shows the ingenuity from that time."

"It has certainly been an enlightening experience to say the least," adds Chris Newby, a senior. "It has opened my eyes to whole new possibilities of what I can do with the skills I have been given. It's truly incredible how much I have learned through this."

Though it's a long way from being finished, Caccamo of Visit DeKalb plans to display the car throughout the summer and fall, including at the annual Auburn Cord Duesenberg Festival in August. "It's not a drivable car at this moment, so right now it will be a rolling mural. Thanks to a matching grant from community industry partners and the Indiana Destination Development Corporation, we have the resources to let them think big," Caccamo says. "We would love to use this as a template to say, 'How else can we tap into the potential of our kids who are so smart and creative, and give them a project they can be excited about digging into? How else can we facilitate this in our county?"

Schoon hopes the project creates not only valuable skills, but lasting memories. "For years, they're going to be able to tell people, 'We built a race car when we were in high school,' and I don't think many kids get to say that."



THE ACD 50TH JUBILEE



In The Beginning... There Was A Group of Dedicated Local Citizens

On April 30, 1973, the Secretary of State of Indiana approved the incorporation of Auburn Automotive Heritage. The founding board of directors consisted of DelMar Johnson, Donald Allison, John Martin Smith, Burtis Dickman, Kurt Hahn, Fred Brown and Herman Collins. The group purchased the former Auburn Automobile Company headquarters in January 1974.

Their mission was "to collect, preserve and restore, and make available to the public automobiles, publications, artifacts, relics, pictures, manuscripts, catalogs, buildings, structures, and all other objects of things of historical significance to the history of the automotive industry in the City of Auburn and the County of DeKalb, Indiana."

An era of exciting automotive history came brilliantly to life when the museum opened its doors at noon on July 6, 1974. It became a permanent institution as a lasting tribute to Auburn's rich motorcar heritage. It was the first automobile museum inhabiting the auto builder's original factory showroom building.

Our Largest Artifact: This Historic Building

The Auburn Automotive Heritage group's first challenge was to raise money to buy the original headquarters of the Auburn Automobile Company, which had been taken over by motorcycle sales organizations, a sportswear manufacturer and a fabricator of fiberglass camper tops. An explosion in the fiberglass section on May 24, 1973, resulted in a fire that damaged the historic building and nearly cost two lives.

The group called on 30-40 Duesenberg owners to return during Auburn's Labor Day festivities to help make the 1973 Auburn Cord Duesenberg Festival a huge success to help raise money for the building and its repair. They estimated 50,000 people would come to Auburn during the 1973 Festival and all profits from admission would be directed to establishing the new museum.

The group purchased the building for \$105,000 (about \$725,000 today) and spent another \$75,000 to repair the showroom with new glass and paint that closely matched the original design. They continued to campaign to repair plumbing, electrical, roof, and remove nonoriginal elements such as false ceilings and floor-bolted machinery. Volunteers and contractors removed debris and repaired holes, cracks and coloring in the terrazzo floors. Painters attempted to match faded colors to return the walls to their original splendor. A local citizen, Kern Butler, had saved half of the Italian tiered lights for the showroom, hoping they would once again illuminate the space. In 1978 the National Register of Historical Places recognized the building on its list of significant structures.

Even now, 50 years later, there is diligent work happening to preserve the historic structure. Our current fundraising drive is dedicated to addressing the building's needs including window restoration, replacement and repair of bricks and masonry, repointing of all brick, window lintel repairs, and more. As a result of leaks in the roof and gutter systems, the museum has experienced damage to historic finishes. Roof replacement, repairs, and the installation of new air handlers was completed in December 2023 – a \$2.1 million project that has been funded by generous donors from across the country.



"Our National Historic Landmark building is home to both innovation and the innovators," states Brandon J. Anderson, executive director & CEO. "We are working hard to restore its glory and integrity so it may continue to both teach and inspire. To further our mission, it is imperative that we take care of our historic building now and in the most appropriate way possible."

Our Cars: What Makes Our Museum Special



1904 Auburn

1903 marked the first year of sales of the Auburn automobile. This 1904 Auburn is the earliest one known to exist. It was donated in 1982 by Thomas Lester of Coconut Creek, Florida. It has features from both the Auburn Model

A and Model B, and could represent a transition between the two models. Total production in 1904 totaled about 50 examples, including the rear-entrance Tonneau in the museum, meaning the passengers entered the back seating from the rear of the car. It was the first ever automobile in the United States to be restored using money from the Federal Conservation Project Support Grant. The as-new price of \$1,250 in 1904 ranked Auburn among the most expensive but finest production automobiles to be offered that year.

1908 Zimmerman Model G

The first automobile ever donated to the Auburn Cord Duesenbera Automobile Museum was the 1908 Zimmerman Model G Runabout. It was donated to the museum by Mr. and Mrs. A. Mearl Bisel of Auburn, Indiana on July 12, 1974, just six days after the museum opened to the public.



The Bisels were instrumental in locating and donating other Auburn-built automobiles to the museum. The high-wheeler Zimmerman showcased the transition of a company that started building horse-drawn carriages before progressing to self-propelled automobiles, all while using common carriage parts.







1921 Duesenberg Model A

This is the very first passenger car sold that displayed the Duesenberg name. It was built by the Duesenberg Automobile and Motors Company in Indianapolis, Indiana. Samuel Northrup Castle of Hawaii purchased the Duesenberg in 1919 and took possession of it in 1921. It bears engine #601 and body #1001. Built to accommodate his seven-foot tall frame, the coupe coachwork was built by the Bender Body Company of Cleveland, Ohio. Being passed down in the family for generations and receiving many modifications, James C. Castle Jr. and his wife CyrAnn decided to have the Duesenberg fully restored to its original configuration. After 99 years of single-family ownership, they decided to donate the 1921 Duesenberg in December 2019 to the museum to keep it in the public trust and to share its story and history with all.

1927 Duesenberg Model X

After E. L. Cord acquired the Duesenberg in 1926, he tasked the company with creating the finest and most powerful automobile they could. This one-off 1927 Duesenberg speedster was built during the transitional and experimental period between the end of the production of the Model A in 1926 and the Model J in 1929. Used to keep the Duesenberg name in the public eye, it was built as a show car. It used the refined single overhead cam engine, now referred to as the Model X, which was soon scrapped for the use of the dual overhead cam engine found in the Model J. It was purchased by hotel magnate Arnold Kirkeby who likely saw it at the 1928 Chicago Auto Show. Over the decades, the speedster fell

into disrepair until it was purchased and restored by donors Peter and Rita Heydon of Ann Arbor, Michigan. This speedster also inspired the design of the 1928 and 1929 Auburn speedsters.









1932 Cord Experimental

This significant Cord automobile showcases a design and style that never came to fruition. It was donated by Paul and Martha Bryant of Prairie Village, Kansas, and Tony and Margaret Carter of San Antonio, Texas. Meant to be the next generation of Cord automobile after the end of production of the Cord L-29, only three experimental "EXPR Cord-12" sedans were produced before the project was halted. The company deemed it uneconomical to introduce the car given the current economic climate. This Cord was restored using parts located throughout the United States, including the engine found in the Auburn power plant next door to the museum. After completing the restoration of the Cord and successfully showing it at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, it was donated to the museum in 2004.

1932 Duesenberg Model J

In September 1981, Don Carr donated his rare Murphy-bodied Duesenberg Speedster, the first Duesenberg donated to the museum. When asked about his donation to the museum, Carr replied, "I never want it to become a mantlepiece. I want to assure that it will always have a good home, be driven, shown and appreciated." When the donation was announced during the 26th annual reunion awards banquet of the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Club, there was a standing ovation by the 500 people that were present. The Duesenberg was originally owned by Cliff Durant, son of William Durant, the founder of General Motors. It was then owned by John Paul Getty, author John O'Hara, and donor Don Carr who purchased it in 1952. Built by the Murphy Body Company of Pasadena, California, it was one of only five built in this style.



group to raise funds to support the

were a very active group that organized
luncheons, style shows, craft shows and
cooking tours, and operated a satellite
gift shop in downtown Auburn. The
Women's Association raised thousands
of dollars for the museum each year
until they disbanded in 2006.





1979 International Scout

This Scout is the second of two prototypes built by the International Harvester Engineering Department in Fort Wayne, Indiana, as part of a project to build a new model of a sport utility vehicle. In 1980, International Harvester decided to scrap the program. International Harvester closed its truck plant in 1983, but nearly 1,000 employees still worked in the Engineering Department in Fort Wayne. In October 1983, the International Harvester Truck Group of Fort Wayne donated the Scout to the museum, driving it from the plant to the museum. The donation of the Scout to the museum is a rare instance of preservation, and ensures the vehicle's survival by placing it in the permanent collection at the museum.
